
Pennsylvania identifies 39,221 children and youth who experienced homelessness – a 7% increase over prior year

A new Pennsylvania (PA) Department of Education report identified its largest number ever of children and youth who experienced homelessness in Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 – 39,221 students, compared to 36,793 students in FY 2018. The chart below shows the number of homeless students for each region in the Education for Children and Youth Experiencing Homelessness (ECYEH) for Fiscal Years (FY) 2015-2019.




PEC reviewed the Pennsylvania Department of Education's reports entitled "Education for Children and Youth Experiencing Homelessness Program 2018-19 Counts by County" and "2018-19 Education of Children and Youth Experiencing Homelessness (ECYEH) Unique and Duplicate Counts by County," summarizing key data points below.


According to the PA Department of Education, "the numbers include children under the age of five and youth enrolled in pre-K through grade 12. The unique count is based on where the child

or youth was **identified** as homeless AND **attributed** to the local education agency (LEA) (school district, comprehensive technical school, or charter/cyber charter school) or entity (shelter, early intervention, pre-K program, etc.)."


- The eight ECYEH regions: Pennsylvania divided up the state into eight regions to manage the ECYEH program. Each region has a regional coordinator who supports the school districts in those regions; or,
- **County:** Some regions are reporting two counties, but the counts are unique.






Highlights

- Pennsylvania's education and community agencies identified 39,221 children and youth experiencing homelessness and served by Pennsylvania's Education for Children and Youth Experiencing Homelessness (ECYEH) program for Fiscal Year (FY) 2019, compared to 36,793 students in FY 2018.
- The data suggests that homelessness among children and youth **throughout** the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is **increasing**.
- Perhaps surprisingly, Philadelphia is not the largest region identifying homeless students. Region 2 identified 8,635 children compared to Philadelphia's 7,847 children.
- **Six** regions identified **more** children and youth in FY '19 than in FY '18. The two regions who identified **fewer** were Regions 2 and 4.
- THE 1000 CLUB: Eleven counties (compared to only nine in 2018) identified greater than 1,000 homeless students, a 3% increase in students over FY '18. The 11 counties of the 1000 Club represent 54% of all children and youth identified as homeless.



- **THE SUB-100 CLUB**: These 18 areas identified less than 100 homeless children and youth experienced a **49% increase** from FY '18.
- 54 of the 72 areas experienced **increases** in the number of students between FY 2018 and FY 2019.

Who Should Read This?

Policy makers and their staff, funders, staff at youth-serving agencies including county human services, school personnel, family advocates and others are encouraged to understand the data and consider expanding efforts to reach out to children and youth who experience homelessness.

They are encouraged to understand that:

- 1. Child and youth homelessness in Pennsylvania is increasing throughout the Commonwealth.
- 2. **No explanations** are provided in the PDE reports, nor does PEC offer that insight. To the best of our knowledge, the homeless housing system has not provided a response to why there are more homeless children and youth over time.
- 3. In PEC's opinion, the **best use** of this data is to assist people who serve children and youth or address family homelessness to understand the trend.
